**New York, NY – Ballet Hispánico**, the nation's preeminent Latino dance institution, will be featured in encore screenings of *Lincoln Center at the Movies: Great American Dance*, a film series presenting performances by three of America's leading companies: Ballet Hispánico, Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, and San Francisco Ballet. Coming to more than 115 theaters nationwide on Tuesday, August 2 at 7:00 pm (local time) is **Ballet Hispánico**, led by **Artistic Director Eduardo Vilaro**, with two audience favorites: *CARMEN.maquia*, an electrifying contemporary take on Bizet's passionate opera choreographed by Spaniard Gustavo Ramírez Sansano, and *Club Havana*, a virtuosic re-imagining of a sizzling nightclub by Cuban-born choreographer Pedro Ruiz. The film will include special behind-the-scenes interviews with the dancers and a glimpse of the company's rehearsals.
