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Rehearsal @ Ballet Hispanico

Wednesday November 13th, 2013

Since I'll be unable to attend <u>Ballet Hispanico</u>'s upcoming performance at the Apollo Theater (on November 23rd), the Company's publicist Michelle Tabnick very kindly arranged for me to watch a studio rehearsal today of Eduardo Vilaro's new creation **HOGAR**. This ballet will have its world premiere at the Apollo Theater performance and is set to music by the Russian composer <u>Lev Zhurbin</u>.

When I arrived at the studio today, the dancers were just about to start a run-thru of **HOGAR** which - though not quite finished choreographically - already reveals a strong sense of structure and utilizes a large cast to striking effect. Mr. Vilaro uses the Zhurbin score, interlaced with some passages danced in silence, to mix ensemble segments with more intimate modules: quartets, duets and solos.

HOGAR (which may be translated as *Home* or *Hearth*) opens with a restless, questing solo danced by Jamal Rashaan Callender. He is then silently observed by the community. The dancing takes flight with some spacious partnering motifs, and individual dancers traverse the space in lively combinations. The first of two central duets is danced by Melissa Fernandez and Mario Ismael Espinoza: a sexy and passionate episode with a touch of quirkiness thrown in. Jamal and his partner Kimberly Van Woesik take the second *pas de deux:* a very attractive couple dancing with expressive physicality. A quartet of men and then a quartet of women sweep across the space, and then a very gently witty and warm duet for two women: Vanessa Valecillos and Jessica Alejandra Wyatt. The ballet's ending is still under construction, and so I left the studio - somewhat reluctantly - so that they could continue working. The late afternoon sun was filtering into the space, making me wish I'd brought along a photographer.

Ballet Hispanico have quickly become one of my favorite ensembles; and it was great to see Chris Bloom again - he has recenty joined the Company and is fitting right in wth his energy and artistry.
